



#### **CAST BIOGRAPHIES**

**RON BRUTON** (Mr. Witherspoon) Ron was born in a one room shack in Northern Alberta to a French-Canadian trapper and an Inuit who was exiled from her home. He learned no social graces growing up, and has only recently learned the finer points of bathing. Considering his upbringing, his acting talent is extraordinary. Of course, considering that, that he can speak is extraordinary. The truth is much less exciting, so to avoid boredom, lies are told.

**JERRY ELLIS** (Rev. Dr. Harper) As a Guild member since the third production, and a past two term president, Jerry has enjoyed the many friendships made along the way. Having had roles as diverse as the sheriff in BUS STOP to Eeyore in WINNIE THE POOH, he feels at home at TGV. "Thanks to everyone for accepting me as I am."

MIKE GLASSCOCK (Teddy Brewster) Mike has carried his bio form with him for weeks with nothing more written than "Mike Glasscock, involved 7 years with TGV in numerous roles, offstage and on." He later added . . . and as the winner of 2 Rosies (TGV's Oscar) and countless memories, this Texas boy has answered to names like Vinnie Bavasi, Colonel Gllweather, Muff Potter, G-1, artist, director, board member, hey you, dad, and son. How many mothers dream of their son being President? For Mother's Day, Mike is flying his mom in from Texas to see him live on stage for the first time since elementary school playing a character who believes he is President. Does that count? Well, as Teddy would say, "Bully, just Bully!" You see, for the Glasscocks, theater is a family affair. Mike and Tammie (his wife), Carl and Monica (his children) would like to thank their extended family at TGV. Mike extends personal thanks to the cast, crew, director and all those supporting the arts.

JOANNE GRINER (Abby Brewster) Joanne has made many appearances on the TGV stage, including the 1994 production of Arsenic and Old Lace playing Aunt Martha that time around. She's been primarily the voice and upfront face of the Guild for the last three years and says being back on stage is great fun!

DONNA JOYNER (Martha Brewster) Donna has been involved with TGV since her debut as one of the angels in the 1996 Christmas show *The Littlest Angel*. Following that scary first step, she appeared in several one acts, in *My Fair Lady* as Mrs. Eynsford-Hill, in *Cat on a Hot Tin Roof* as Big Mama, and in both productions of *Dearly Departed* as Marguerite. She is one of TGV's biggest fans because she believes it is made up of a great bunch of folks and because she believes it is a great community asset and creative outlet. **KEN KINARD** (Mortimer Brewster) Ken has been a member of TGV for 10 years and has served on the Board of Directors as vice president for one year and has performed in *Once Upon a Mattress, A Funny Thing Happened on the Way to the Forum, The Lion in Winter, Anything Goes, My Fair Lady, Alone Together, Moon Over Buffalo, Dial M for Murder, Wait Until Dark, Proposals and this year's production of <i>The Odd Couple*, where he played the part of Felix Ungar, just to name a few.

#### **CAST BIOGRAPHIES**

**RAY LAMBERT** (Lt. Rooney) This is Ray's USA grand debut as a first time performer on TGV's stage. He is from Montreal, Canada where he co-hosted a French TV series called "Genie En Herbe" (Young Genius). He also acted with a college group called "Troubadour" in Canada. The play *Arsenic and Old Lace* is what attracted him to the audition. "I love comedy and this one is a classic. I really enjoy the Rooney character and hope that the audience will enjoy it too."

**TOM MANNING** (Mr. Gibbs) Tom is in his first TGV production but has helped behind the scenes with two previous children's productions, Mrs. Claus' Tiny Tales and The Reluctant Dragon. He has been married for twelve years to his beautiful wife Arlene and has two lovely daughters, Morgan and Erin. Tom was born and raised in New York City and is a Professor of Chemistry at Valdosta State University. His father, a retired NYPD officer, played a role in Arsenic and Old Lace a decade ago in a community theater in Seneca, SC, and his brother, James, teaches theater and communications at Western Carolina University (NC).

SEGAL OWENS (Officer Brophy) Segal was born and raised in Chicago, and is an active member of the Boy Scouts. His talents include playing brass instruments in the school band and with the Jackson Raiders Drum & Bugle Corps. He was employed with the Ramtite Company as a Structural Steel Mill Furnace Draftsman and then attended evening college classes with sights on engineering. Two years later, he enlisted in the US Air Force, serving as a Munitions Maintenance Specialist ("AMMO") and a security policeman for eight years. He retired after 24 years, 4 months, and 9 days from Moody AFB, G2. He graduated with honors in Management and Electronics with 192 college credits. He has been employed with Dillard's Store Systems since 1995 as a POS Engineer. Segal's stage experience with TGV includes The Littlest Angel, Kiss Me Kate, No Time for Sergeants, and the recent Dearly Departed as backstage crew.

**RICK PATRICK** (Jonathan Brewster) Rick is very happy to be repeating the role of Jonathan in this "encore" presentation of *Arsenic and Old Lace*. Since 1992, he's been involved in TGV as an actor, director, stage manager, as well as board member on two occasions. Some favorite roles include Elwood P. Dowd in *Harvey*, Capt. von Trapp in *Sound of Music*, Moonface Martin in *Anything Goes* and Col. Jessup in *A Few Good Men*. "I hope you enjoy tonight's production."

**KELLY PHILLIPS** (Elaine Harper) Kelly lives in Lake Park with her husband Alan and two children, Justin and Brandon. She moved to Georgia in 1980 from the Dallas/Ft. Worth area. Prior to *Arsenic and Old Lace*, her theater experience was a high school production of *The Curious Savage*. This was her first time auditioning for TGV. She is employed at Doctors Laboratory and Greenleaf Center. She is currently enrolled in the Nursing Program at Valdosta Technical College. She hopes to be in more plays in the future because this one has been so much fun.

#### **CAST BIOGRAPHIES**

JACK PRUDEN (Dr. Einstein) Arsenic and Old Lace marks Jack's 19<sup>th</sup> appearance on the TGV stage, starting with Harvey during the 1993-94 season. Prior to that he had not been in amateur theater since high school in 1946 except for A Thousand Clowns at US Embassy Bangkok in 1979. Roles have ranged from Erronious in A Funny Thing Happened on the Way to the Forum to Norman Thayer in On Golden Pond. In the current season he played St. George in The Reluctant Dragon. In Arsenic he reprises as Dr. Einstein, paired again with Rick Patrick as Jonathan. He invites all playgoers to enjoy the malapropisms of the Brewster household as part of the encore season. Jack is retired from the Foreign Service and the information systems industry, and has resided in Valdosta for 23 years with his wife Marjorie who has become TGV's "costumer extraordinaire".

MARK SMITH (Officer Klein) Mark is currently a student at Valdosta State University and will graduate in December of 2003. He is a graduate of Valwood School where he acted in *Dirty Work at the Crossroads* and *Miracle Worker*. This will be his first performance with the wonderful people at Theatre Guild Valdosta.

FRED STIKKEL (Officer O'Hara) Fred really is an actor, not a police officer, although he's played one many times. In fact, since 1996, he has been in so many plays at TGV that they won't all fit, but here's a few: Anything Goes as the Captain, Oldest Living Graduate as Mike Tramaine, Barefoot in the Park as Victor Vlasco, No Time for Sergeants as the draft man and Gen. Bush, My Fair Lady as Alphie Doolittle, Something's A Foot as the Gripper/ Caretaker, Out of Order as the waiter, Little Shop of Horrors as the Bum, Wait Until Dark as the Cop and most recently as Murray the Cop in The Odd Couple. Fred is also an exceptional set builder and has had a hand in every set on this stage since 1996.

Picking up where the famous stories end, the play centers on a death threat against Sherlock Holmes by the supposed son of his late nemesis, Professor Moriarty. TGV was organized in 1989 through the efforts of the Lowndes/Valdosta Arts Commission as an autonomous community theater group with non-profit tax-exempt status. After three years as a group of vagabond players with no home, the group purchased the old 'Dosta Theatre building in 1992 and set about converting the dilapidated movie theatre into a playhouse for live stage performances. Thanks to many supporters and one large benefactor, TGV now owns three adjoining buildings in historic downtown Valdosta, performs four main stage shows and two children's shows each year. All of this is done in order to provide a high quality theater experience to as diverse an audience and group of participants as possible.
