Director's Notes

Tennessee Williams' Cat on a Hot Tin Roof opened in 1955 to sharply divided critical reaction. Many critics felt it was his masterpiece; many felt it was further proof that the Williams' power as a dramatist was on the wane. The subject matter was shocking to the world of 1955 and even today is viewed by many with varying degrees of discomfort. The characters are earthy Southern people, drawn rich in human foibles and strengths. The principal theme, at least for this director, became that of mendacity. The lies told by the Pollitt family- to each other, to the outside world, to themselves- over-shadow the celebration of the 65th birthday of Big Daddy. The underlying themes of alcoholism, homosexuality, love, greed, life and death feed these lies and, possibly, in the end help to feed the truth, whatever it might be for each family member. Mr. Williams has given us no easy answers in these 3 acts; but certainly, he has given us something that, while set in 1955, has meaning for us today.

In response to numerous concerns from our patrons we reprinted the following tips with permission from the communication arts program at VSU. We hope they will enrich your theatre experience.

Stay and show your appreciation.

A quick departure is noticed by everyone in the audience, and especially by the performers on stage. Making a mad dash for the exit expresses inconsiderate behavior. The performers CAN see you, so please wait until the house lights go up.

Hearing a pin drop.

We are delighted if the performance proves to be "the talk of the town", but please wait until intermission or final curtain to carry on lengthy conversations. In addition, everyone will certainly hear the sound of a crumpling cellophane wrapper from a piece of candy. Why not "pop" your candy into your mouth before entering?

We were here... Where were you?

Arriving late to the theatre is never considered "fashionably late". After the performance has begun, we will ask that latecomers wait until a suitable time before being seated. The same reminder applies at intermissions. Leaving your seat during the performance may also keep you from being allowed to re-enter until an appropriate time.

Lovely to look at... and preserve.

Help us preserve the condition of our theatre by finishing ALL snacks and beverages before entering and depositing any trash in an appropriate receptacle. Remember, NO FOOD OR DRINK IS ALLOWED IN THE THEATRE, and as always smoking is permitted outside the building only.

The great "escape".

Just as you mentally leave your earthly boundaries and are transported to another time and place becoming one with the performers, Suddenly, your neighbor starts "beeping" like a four alarm fire. Watches with alarms, cellular phones and beepers are distracting and annoying to everyone. Please be considerate or your neighbors as you would expect the same consideration from them.

Recording.

We strictly prohibit the use of any recording or photographic device.

Please look over the emergency exits' diagram in your program and notice any of your fellow patrons that may need your help in an emergency.
