





The Playwright - Neil Simon



"The way I see things, life is both sad and funny. I can't imagine a comical situation that isn't at the same time also painful. I used to ask myself: What is a humorous situation? Now I ask: What is a sad situation and how can I tell it humorously?"

Marvin Neil Simon was born on July 4, 1927, the second son of Irving Simon, a traveling salesman, and his wife Mamie. He grew up in the Bronx in New York City. He attended New York University (1944-45) and the University of Denver (1945-46) before joining the United States Army where he began his writing career working for the Army camp newspaper. After being discharged from the army, Simon returned to New York and took a job as a mailroom clerk for Warner Brother's. He and his brother Danny began writing comedy shows for radio, then television where they worked with Woody Allen and Mel Brooks. Simon received Emmy Award nominations for his television writing, then moved on to the stage.

He quickly established himself as America's most successful playwright by creating an unmatched string of Broadway hits beginning with *Come Blow Your Horn*. During the 1966-67 season, *Barefoot in the Park, The Odd Couple, Sweet Charity* and *The Star Spangled Girl* were all running at the same time.

The Odd Couple premiered at Plymouth Theatre in New York City in 1965. It was directed by Mike Nichols and starred Walter Matthau as Oscar and Art Carney as Felix. Other plays by Neil Simon: Plaza Suite, Last of the Red Hot Lovers, Promises, Promises, California Suite, Chapter Two which was considered by many critics to be his finest play to that date, They're Playing Our Song, Brighton Beach Memoirs, Biloxi Blues, Broadway Bound. He followed up in 1991 with Lost in Yonkers for which he won the Pulitzer Prize for Drama.



History of Theatre Guild Valdosta

Theatre Guild Valdosta (TGV) was organized in 1989 through the efforts of the Lowndes/Valdosta Arts Commission as an autonomous community theater group with non-profit, tax-exempt status. After three years as a group of vagabond players with no "home," the group purchased the old 'Dosta Theater building in 1992, and set about converting the dilapidated movie theater into a playhouse for live stage performances.

Thanks to many supporters and one large benefactor, TGV now owns three adjoining buildings in historic downtown Valdosta, performs four main stage shows, an evening of one-acts and two children's shows each year. All of this is done in order to provide high quality theater experience to as diverse an audience and group of participants as possible.

Theatre Etiquette

The following tips are reprinted with permission from the communication arts program at VSU. We hope they will enrich your theatre experience.

Stay and show your appreciation.

A quick departure is noticed by everyone in the audience, and especially by the performers on stage. Making a mad dash for the exit expresses inconsiderate behavior. The performers CAN see you, so please wait until the house lights go up.

Hearing a pin drop.

We are delighted if the performance proves to be "the talk of the town", but please wait until intermission or final curtain to carry on lengthy conversations. In addition, everyone will certainly hear the sound of a crumpling cellophane wrapper from a piece of candy. Why not "pop" your candy into your mouth before entering?

We were here... Where were you?

Arriving late to the theatre is never considered "fashionably late." After the performance has begun, we will ask that latecomers wait until a suitable time before being seated. The same reminder applies at intermissions. Leaving your seat during the performance may also keep you from being allowed to re-enter until an appropriate time.

Lovely to look at... and preserve.

Help us preserve the condition of our theatre by finishing ALL snacks and beverages before entering and depositing any trash in an appropriate receptacle. Remember, NO FOOD OR DRINK IS ALLOWED IN THE THEATRE, and as always smoking is permitted outside the building only.

The great "escape."

Just as you mentally leave your earthly boundaries and are transported to another time and place becoming one with the performers, suddenly, your neighbor starts "beeping" like a four alarm fire. Watches with alarms, cellular phones, and beepers are distracting and annoying to everyone. Please be considerate of your neighbors as you would expect the same consideration from them.
