WHO'S WHO IN THE COMPANY

Cathy Gilbert (Penelope Sycamore) is a "military brat" who has been involved since kindergarten with school and community drama in many places throughout the U.S. and Europe. She has written original plays, two of which have been produced in Germany. Among her numerous credits of acting/directing are THE LIT-TLE PRINCE, THE IMAGINARY INVALID, ARIA DACAPO, THE LOT-TERY, A MARRIAGE PROPOSAL, WHO'S AFRAID OF VIRGINIA WOLF, THE MOUSE THAT ROARED, EARLY FROST, BLITHE SPIRIT, and a French-speaking production of AU RESTAURANT. Her most recent performance was in the Theatre Guild's production of THE MOUSETRAP. Cathy is an English teacher at Lowndes High School, and is married to L.A. Gilbert; they have one son, Heath.

Sarita Rainey (Essie Carmichael) is a sophomore at Valdosta High School and very active in drama. This is her first time on stage for the Theatre Guild. She was the lighting director for THE MOUSETRAP last spring. She plans to pursue drama as a career.

Denise J. Steptoe (Rheba) is a Language Arts/Drama teacher at Echols County School. She has been involved in college and community theatre for the last twelve years. She has experience in acting, directing, set, costume, and makeup design. Among the many characters she has portrayed in the past, her favorites include Ado Annie in OKLAHOMA, Ellie Mae Chipley in SHOWBOAT, and Carrie Pipperidge in CAROUSEL. Since joining the Theatre Guild, she has played Sally Cato McDougal in AUNTIE MAME and Grace in BUS STOP.

Richard Nunley (Paul) is a second year Valdostan and a native of northern Ohio. Richard is the band director for the Clinch County Schools, a member of the Valdosta Choral Guild, and choir director at the Homerville United Methodist Church. In Ohio, Richard directed music for a number of student productions including AN-NIE GET YOUR GUN.

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Michael C. Lowe (Mr. DePinna) is a registered nurse who returns for his second performance with the Theatre Guild. He previously appeared as Dr. Lyman in BUS STOP. Additionally, he has performed as Bill Sikes in OLIVER TWIST, Gramps in THE BOY WITH GREEN HAIR, and Gollum in THE HOBBIT. He is an experienced ventriloguist as Max Wolf in "The Wolfman's Review". Alex Penn (Ed) is a native Valdostan but has traveled extensively, including a three year period in the Orient. A 13-year-old eighth grader at Valwood, Alex's favorite subject is algebra. He enjoys horseback riding, swimming, tennis, reading, singing, and acting. While in the sixth grade, Alex played the role of Baby John in WEST SIDE STORY at the local college in Fort Walton Beach, Florida.

Jim Rinehart (Donald) is in the Air Force stationed at Moody AFB. He also attends Valdosta State College where he is seeking a degree in accounting. Jim would like to sing professionally, but for now uses his vocal talents in the Chancel Choir at the Bemiss Road United Methodist Church and at weddings. During his childhood, Jim had roles in GYPSY and LIFE WITH FATHER. He was last seen as Cousin Jeff and Mr. Claude Uspon in AUNTIE MAME which was produced by the Theatre Guild this past year.

Albert Pendleton (Martin Vanderhof), native Valdostan, is curator of the Lowndes Historical Society museum. For eighteen years, he has been editor of the Society's newsletter. A handicapped veteran of WWII, he has acted in several productions for Valdosta Little Theatre; among them: THE HASTY HEART, THE FANTASTICKS, GYPSY, LIFE WITH FATHER, and WAIT UNTIL DARK. Writing, researching local history and playwriting are specialties. He is coauthor, with Susan McKey Thomas, of In Search of the Hollidays, <u>The Story of Doc Holliday</u>. His play MANY MANSIONS was produced in 1971, by Valdosta Little Theatre. Albert co-authored the LVAC musical BAZE! with Botie Chitty in 1980. Albert and his wife, Lonie, have five children and five grandchildren. He was Grandpa in YOU CAN'T TAKE IT WITH YOU in a VSC-VLT production in 1979. He continues to write -- and hope. Go see him at the museum!

Heather Epes (Alice Sycamore) is a senior at Valwood School. She has been a member of Valwood's Valiant Players for three years. For her portrayal as the leprechaun in STORIES OF AMERICA, Heather was named Best Actress in the State in 1988. She garnered the Region Best Actress Award this past October as Miss Chapman in PARENT'S DAY. She was a dancer in the Valdosta Dance Theatre for three years and also played numerous dramatic roles in their productions, such as Shirley Mulhollum in FAME, Glinda in the WIZARD OF OZ, and the maid in THE NUTCRACKER. She was a student of Nilo Toledo's Dance Camp and earned a part in his production of HELLO DOLLY. Heather minored in drama in the Governor's Honors Program during the summer of 1988. Bill Tucker (Henderson) is a Medical Technologist, employed at South Georgia Medical Center, as Laboratory Supervisor on the "graveyard" shift. He is married to Helen and they have two sons, Marty and Keith. This is Bill's first appearance on any stage and we hope he will return time and time again.

Jason Avery (Tony Kirby) recently arrived from England after graduating from Lakenheath High School. Even though he's had 4 years in theatre, it wasn't until his senior year that Jason decided to make it his career. He attends VSC, pursuing a major in drama. Jason loves to make people laugh and thinks a career on stage or in front of a camera would be the most fulfilling way to reach the most people. We agree!

Jason Wade (Boris Kolenkhov) is a student at Valdosta State College and a member of Pi Kappa Phi fraternity. He works for Sure Shot Photography and Southern Ocean Sports. He has appeared in such shows as SCROOGE'S CHRISTMAS, SOUTH PACIFIC, MICE AND MEN, TO KILL A MOCKING BIRD, and HILLBILLY WEDDDING.

Teri E. Moser (Gay Wellington) is the Chief Executive Officer for Government Contracting Consultants, Inc. here in Valdosta. Formerly, she owned and operated International Management Consultant Firm in Williamsburg, VA. She has had extensive experience in dance and drama in Williamsburg and Richmond, VA., Columbia, MD., and Washington, D.C. including assistant director for an Improvisational Children's Workshop. Her list of performances include such notable plays as CAMELOT, WEST SIDE STORY, DAMN YANKEES, FIDDLER ON THE ROOF, AMEN CORNER, and many, many more. The Theatre Guild is thrilled that Teri and husband, Gary, and children, Scott, Marie, and Ellis now call Valdosta home.

SSgt. Ernie D. Whitlow (Mr. Kirby) is a Muskegon, Michigan native now stationed at Moody AFB. He appeared on stage throughout junior and senior high school and played recently as Mr. Lindsey Woolsey in AUNTIE MAME and also as an ego of Vernon in THEY'RE PLAYING OUR SONG.

Debbi Hart (Mrs. Kirby) is Assistant Chemistry Supervisor in the laboratory at South Georgia Medical Center. She also works as a Mary Kay Beauty Consultant. Debbi was active in drama in high school and college in Kentucky. She has appeared with the Theatre Guild as one of Sonya's egos in THEY'RE PLAYING OUR SONG and as Cousin Fan in AUNTIE MAME. Hugh Brown ("The Man") works for Medtram Services, Inc. as a driver. He was percussionist for THEY'RE PLAYING OUR SONG. He portrayed Mr. Babcock in AUNTIE MAME and Carl in BUS STOP. Hugh's interest include being in the out-doors and working with plants. Acting has become a very fun extracurricular activity in Hugh's life.

Warren Woods (Jim) played older Patrick in AUNTIE MAME. He portrayed Bo Decker in BUS STOP. Warren is from Seattle, Washington. He is a surgical assistant in the Air Force. He is a model. Warren plays the trumpet, and reads, writes, and speaks German.

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Roland "Sonny" Chisolm (Mac) recently served successfully as Stage Manager for BUS STOP. His Valdosta stage experience has been limited to on-stage performances and technical work for AUN-TIE MAME and offstage voice-overs and lighting for THEY'RE PLAY-ING OUR SONG. Roland faces all his challenges with a smile on his lips, a song in his heart, and crossed fingers behind his back. The Theatre Guild has been fortunate to have Sonny as a friend and a most willing participant.

Sherrie Farabee (Olga) works as a secretary for a local company and has been involved in college and community theatre for about eight years. She appeared as Nora Muldoon in the Guild's fall production of AUNTIE MAME and directed the Guild's pre-season production of THE MOUSETRAP.

Mary Ann Green (Director) "makes a living" as Blood Bank Supervisor at South Georgia Medical Center. She "makes a difference" with her involvement in the theatre. For the past nine years, she has directed Valwood School's Valiant Players. Under her direction, the group has garnered a total of 22 Region and State Awards in One Act Play Competition and produced for the public BLITHE SPIRIT, CHARLEY'S AUNT, and THE NIGHT OF JANUARY 16th. Mary Ann has appeared in Valdosta State College productions portraying General Cartwright in GUYS AND DOLLS and Kate Parr in ROYAL GAMBIT. Other area acting roles include THE PEN IS DEADLIER, WHAT THE BUTLER SAW, BLITHE SPIRIT, HAMLET, THE MOUSETRAP, and others. She is married to her best friend, a local Landscape Architect, Charles Green. Her daughter, Lisa Kunert, is a junior Fine Arts Management Major at Berry College in Rome, Georgia. Frank Steele (Producer) is a choral director and active in community theatre. He has directed, appeared in and played for many productions in school, college and community theatre. Most recently he has directed THEY'RE PLAYING OUR SONG and AUNTIE MAME.

Kerri Miller (Stage Manager) is a Junior at Valwood School. From her beginnings with the Valiant Players as a sign carrying "extra" in BERTHA, THE BARTENDER'S BEAUTIFUL BABY, to her recent portrayal as Erika Sharpe in PARENT'S DAY, Kerri has demonstrated that she is an actress with potential. This is her first association with the Theatre Guild and we welcome her to our family.

Ellen Oliver (Artistic Designer) is an award winning portraitist. In addition, her murals have decorated the walls of local residential homes and schools. Her reproduction of Ocean Pond at J.P. This is her first Theatre Guild production, however, she was scenic designer for this same play as a senior at Valdosta High School. Ellen is married to local realtor, Jack Oliver.
